80%

Of children and youth who need mental health services do not receive them. Medicaid cuts would significantly exacerbate this problem



45.2%

Of districts currently utilize Medicaid funds to improve mental health services



30%

Proposed cuts in Medicaid would impact districts' ability to continue to provide special education services as required by law



68%

Of districts use Medicaid funding to pay for direct salaries for health professionals, such as school psychologists

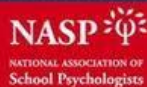
